Armando **Crisostomo**, former UP College of Medicine Associate Dean for Planning and Research and affiliate faculty of the National Teacher Training Center for the Health Professions, was appointed Vice Chancellor for Research of UP Manila.

A colorectal surgeon, grading Crisostomo has significant qualifications, achievements, and skills in the fields of health education, research, and extension service that he can apply in his new post.

In 2017, he headed the UPCM Commission on Grading Standards and Practices that conducted the first comprehensive evaluation of the College's standards practices and and recommended important reforms to be undertaken. He is also Chairperson of the Philippine Alliance for Patient Safety. It was a wonderful cap to 2018 for UP Manila as it sustained the exemplary performance of graduates and maintained its position as a top performing university in the licensure examinations of the Professional Regulation Commission held from September to December.

First to bring honor are the graduates of the College of Medicine and the School of Health Sciences (SHS). In the September 2018 Physician Licensure Exam, the lone board taker from UPM-SHS, Renalyne Dungo Garcia, and 140 out of 142 (98.59%) from UPCM hurdled the test. Three landed in the Top Ten: Ma.

Sucaldito, 4th (90.42 %), Ron Michael Labador **Castillo**, 5th (90.08 %); and Marie Abigail Rivera Lim, 10th (89.58 %).

The nursing graduates from both the College of Nursing and SHS posted the highest among the batches in the November Nursing Licensure Examination. All 39 graduates from UPCN passed the exam with 10 making it to the Top Ten.

They are Robert Lacayang Mejia (86.40),3rd; Ella Mae Lolith Panal Mahilum Micahella Jane Castañares Merencilla (85.80), 5th; Lyka Mauleon Sergia Fatima Papiona Delos Santos and Sophia

Alberto Tubera (85.20), 8th; Andrea Franchesca Dela Cruz Descalzo and Sophia Ruth Santos Mora (85), 9th; and Andrei Jane **Francisco Gavino** and Susanna Martha Beltran **Ibe** (84.80%), 10th.

SHS had 17 passers out of 19 (89.47%) examinees.

# Equity and service classifications tackled in UHC fora

The UP Manila Health Policy Development Hub (HPDH), with the Department of Health (DOH) and the Philippine Council for Health Research and Development, under the Advancing Health through Evidence-assisted Decisions with Health Policy Systems Research (AHEAD-HPSR) program, held two roundtable discussions (RTDs) on the Universal Health Care Bill.

Senate Bill 1896 or society approach.

Universal Health Care (UHC) Act supports the right of every Filipino to have access to preventive, promotive, curative, rehabilitative, and palliative health services while providing maximal and equitable financial protection to the whole population. The bill seeks to institute health care for all Filipinos using a framework that is a whole-of-system, whole-ofgovernment, and whole-of-

The first forum was entitled "Beyond hospital beds: Equity, service, and quality" held on 29 November 2018 that aimed to expound the policy implications of SB 1896 to the Philippine public health landscape as it nears ratification. It was attended representatives from the academe, government and agencies, government organizations.

During the RTD, Dr. Esmeralda Silva, CPH

professor and HPDH member noted that most of the indicators need a more operational definition and certain useful indicators may also be added, such as cultural access, effects of natural and conflict-driven disasters on communities, and quality of care measures.

The participants identified the following challenges in the current process for the allocation of health investments:

# PGH director appointed to second term



PGH Director Dr. Gerardo Legaspi

Gerardo 'Gap' Legaspi, current Philippine General Hospital chief, has been reappointed to a second term effective January 1, 2019 until December 31, 2021 as approved by the UP Board of Regents during its 1340th meeting.

The highly regarded neurosurgeon, also the lone nominee for directorship, pledged the following programs for the next three years: Computerization, Infrastructure Development, Research, Strengthening the Role of PGH as a National University Hospital, and Improving the Governance of PGH.

Under Dr. Legaspi's watch, upgrades on PGH were carried out, such as the hospital's information system, equipment and devices, research, and projects. infrastructure In a public forum held on October 28, 2018 at the UP Manila Social Hall, Dr. Legaspi presented his vision for PGH for the next term which was followed by an open forum.

Не reported an increase in the income of PGH to P200M in 2015 to

exceeding P1 billion for 2017, and total processed PhilHealth claims rising to almost 300% to 74,181 in 2017 from 24,919 in 2014.

As part of the Computerization Program, the medical records have been digitized, wireless internet was made available around the hospital and can be freely accessed, and upcoming mobile 'apps' will soon be launched that will ease the public's navigation around PGH and will provide a step-by-step guide on the processes of the hospital.

Dr. Legaspi also announced that a new robotic system has been purchased recently, and by the end of the year, additional MRI machine, surgical and neurosurgical equipment will also be acquired.

To better preserve the hospital's equipment and to provide a more conducive environment, part of Dr. Legaspi's infrastructure plans is the repair of sewerage, electrical, and drainage systems. Several buildings will also be constructed, such as the 15-story Neuroscience 2017, PhilHealth payments Center, 12-story Cancer

Care Center, dietary building, dormitories, parking spaces, and transient facilities. The restoration and renovation of old buildings will be supported largely private donations.

"A way to distinguish PGH from other hospitals is to produce our own brand," Dr. Legaspi declared. He mentioned this together with plans for inventions innovations with the "PGH brand" under research program. This, and improving the publication rate while expanding the funding support to consultants and staff members, are his ways to advance the quality of patient care.

To strengthen the role of PGH as a national university hospital, Dr. Legaspi will establish PGH Medical System (PGH Healthcare) coordinate and centralize the operations of three upcoming branches of the PGH in Clark, Diliman, and Los Baños. A National Cancer Institute site, a PGH brand of Primary Care Service, and a PGH-designed Service Delivery Network all be included in this umbrella project.

One of Dr. Legaspi's constant concerns is how to improve patient-care for both charity and private patients. For this, his answer was 'governance.' By adopting some corporate system business processes, outsourcing non-core administrative functions, lobbying for more plantilla positions that increase direct patient service delivery, and creating a position for a hospital CEO, Dr. Legaspi believes a more nurturing hospital can be

The director capped the forum with these words, "PGH is not just a community hospital in Ermita. PGH is created to be the hospital of the poor and has acquired through time, the university hospital function. Any administrator should have the skill to provide for service and academics. Three years ago, we were able to achieve 90% of this plan. And I was asked, 'What if you fail?' I answered, 'Failure is not an option."

# Estacio reappointed CAS dean

Prof. Leonardo Estacio collaborative programs. was appointed dean of the College of Arts and Sciences by the UP Board of Regents at its 339th regular meeting held on Nov. 9, 2018. He will serve a second term as CAS top administrative and academic leader for three years.

Dean Estacio sought a second term on a sixkey area platform of Research Innovation and Cutting-edge Technology, Internationalization and Linkages for Mutual Benefit, Student-centered Learning Extension Environment, Service for Distressed Unified Communities, Academic Program, and Professionalization of Faculty and Staff.

Under Research Innovation, he envisions the College to implement more novel and innovative research projects, patents and copyrights; collaborative research programs with regional local, international research institutions; engage research capacity building for faculty and in the translation of research into concrete policies and programs; generate viable technologies for social and economic development; development of facilities and equipment relevant to research.

For Internationalization and Linkages, Dean Estacio hopes to build on and strengthen research, academic and public service collaborative work with local and international universities and private institutions including the alumni of the College for mutual benefit. The strategy includes faculty and student exchange programs, joint program offerings, conferences, resource generation programs for institutional development, and networking and linkages with alumni more sustained

To achieve a **Student** 

Centered Learning Environment, administration aims to produce graduates that lead and excel in their chosen field of practice and profession through the following measures: development of more relevant student services, such as housing program, scholarships, counseling and behavioral intervention programs and facilities; institutionalization student exchange programs; more holistic student development through community engagement, sports and wellness, and other scholarly pursuits; and modernized classroom environment and facilities and enhanced delivery of library services.

Providing responsive, enabling and sustaining programs, and services to distressed communities is also part of his flagship programs. Specific measures to achieve this goal include the development of community-based and direct services programs and capacity-building of distressed communities through involvement of faculty, staff, and students

Under his thrust on **Unified Academic** Program, Dean Estacio envisions to "unify the academic program and make it more aligned to the health sciences and health social sciences field." This will be implemented through re-alignment of academic programs to outcomes-based education system, development of more relevant and cuttingedge degree programs for health and wellness, evaluation and assessment of degree programs for improvement further and development, and development of facilities and equipment relevant to instruction.

For the **Professionalization** 

of Faculty and Staff, capacity building activities will be pursued, as well as institutionalization of faculty exchange programs and additional faculty and staff plantilla for security of tenure.

### Achievements as CAS dean

For more than 30 years now, Dean Estacio has been providing direct services to the indigenous peoples, urban poor groups, farmers, children and women's group and other distressed groups.

As an internationally and nationally recognized expert in drug abuse prevention and education, community and social development, indigenous knowledge systems and practices, qualitative and mixed methods research in designing community-based development programs and training curriculum, he has been engaged for quite a number of times by UN agencies as short-term international consultant in research, training, and program development.

He has facilitated the review and revision of the CAS vision and mission; worked for a unified, well-aligned and health-oriented academic, research and public service programs for the college; established the Office of Associate Dean for Research and Public Service; institutionalized the holding of yearly CAS Student Leader's Summit; institutionalized the hosting of regular round-table discussions lectures and public faculty members and local and foreign scholars; worked for the establishment of a regular culture and arts program and initiated together with the P.E. professors, the establishment of a

# 1st National Environmental and Occupational Health Forum held

The First National Environmental and Occupational Health Forum, with the theme Challenges **Opportunities** in **Environmental** and Occupational Health, provided platform environmental and health occupational practitioners, researchers, policy makers, academicians and students to broaden their knowledge on pressing global and national concerns like climate change, poor occupational health conditions of informal sector workers, problems with the notification system for occupational diseases and injuries, issues on water, sanitation, and hygiene (WaSH) in healthcare facilities, indoor air pollution,

and carcinogenic potential of fish from Laguna Lake.

The one-day forum was held on November 28 at the AG New World together 137 stakeholders from the Philippines and other countries.

UP Manila Vice Chancellor challenges

for Administration, Dr. Arlene Samaniego, welcomed the participants and guests to the forum on behalf of UP Manila Chancellor Carmencita Manila Bay Hotel. It brought D. Padilla. Her message stressed the need to address the current environmental and occupational health affecting

Philippines.

her keynote speech, Department of Health Assistant Secretary Ma. Rosario S. **Vergeire** mentioned that the developments are inevitably leading to changes in the environment.

"The changes alert us and the generations

us to the reality that the future relies mainly on the decisions and actions that we undertake now and that the failure to address current concerns environmental occupational health would mean adverse effects for to come," she stated.

Asec. Vergeire's keynote speech was followed by discussion of global local environmental occupational health concerns by experts from the World Health Organization-Western Pacific Regional Office and Country Office, University of the Minnesota, First Philippine Holdings Corporation, and the CPH's Department of Environmental and Occupational Health.

The inclusion speakers from international agencies and organizations provided global perspectives on environmental occupational health as well as opportunities that are available to address the most pressing concerns in the environment and workplace.

### WHAT HEALTH LITERACY **CAN CONTRIBUTE TO SMART HEALTHCARE**


The Asia Health Literacy Association (AHLA) Country Office, based in UP Manila College of Public Health, organized its first public lecture on health literacy on 29 November 2018 entitled, "What health literacy can contribute to smart healthcare." The lecture was given by Dr. Peter WS Chang, Secretary General and President-elect of AHLA, at the CPH Auditorium.

It was attended by faculty, staff, and students from within and outside UP Manila. Represented during the event were academic institutions such as Ateneo School of Medicine and Public Health and Manila Central University, drug company (MSD Philippines), government agencies (DOH, DOST-PCHRD), and Taipei Representative Office in the Philippines.

Dr. Chang started the lecture by defining the concept of health literacy an individual's skill to access,

understand, appraise, and apply health information and services in a way that enhances health. He then talked about the critical role of health literacy in patient outcomes, health care costs, and the like. He presented data showing that patients with low health literacy are more likely to use emergency room services, have longer hospital stays, are less likely to follow treatment plans, and have higher mortality rates. He highlighted the role of health care providers in improving patient health literacy and the benefits of patient engagement which includes improved health outcomes.

The last part of his talk was about what health care providers can do to improve population health literacy. The 5 STEPS to better health literacy were useful tips for health care providers: speak slowly, teach-back, encourage questions, use plain language, and show examples.

the implementation of the WHO Safe Surgery checklist, the first ASEAN Patient Safety training Congress, and workshops for the WHO Patient Safety Curriculum.

As Philippine College of Surgeons President and member, he developed standardized evaluation for general surgery training programs, helped formulate a standard curriculum for the Philippines, and promoted the formulation of curriculum on professionalism.

Occupying various posts at the Philippine Board of Surgery, he conducted training workshops for examiners and developed the following: a competency-

based format for residency in-training examinations, innovation moduleof based rating scales for oral examinations, examiner assessment for oral examiners, and examinee assessment of written and oral examinations.

Dr. Crisostomo was awarded Outstanding Educator by the UP Medical Alumni Society in 2016. He has reaped numerous other general surgery residency in awards as student leader, educator, researcher, writer, and physician from different recognition bodies and organizations.

His appointment follows the approval by the UP

Board of Regents of the proposal to amend the BOR Resolution establishing the position of Assistant Research (now Vice Chancellor for Research) in UP Manila concurrently serving as Executive Director of the National Institutes of Health (NIH) by abrogating the concurrent nature of both positions, and appointing a separate NIH Executive Director while retaining the position of Vice Chancellor for Research.

The justification was based on the fact that the tasks of the NIH have mutiplied Journal (now Philippine with its five component Journal for Health Research institutes increasing to 10 with additional four research and training centers.

the tendency for the local chief executives (LCEs) to be influenced by political interests; conflict budgeting timeline at the national and local levels can affect the Local Investment Planning for Health (LIPH); the Health Facility Enhancement Program (HFEP) may not be invested in true priority areas; problems in referrals across health facilities; Barangay Health Stations (BHS) are being underutilized due to unavailability of medical staff, inadequate facilities, and insufficient supply of medicines; and medicine overpricing and the use of medicine as a ttpolitical tool.

**Provisions of the UHCAct** that are directly and indirectly related to equity were critically reviewed to ensure recommendations consistent with the technicalities of the law. LIPH is seen as a tool in the demand-side planning and its monitoring involves several censors which should be included in the LGU scorecard.

In terms of enhancing health service delivery, participants agreed to explore all possible

channels including homecare and telecare and look into providing services for wellness and diseases prevention. All DOH units were enjoined to use the Performance Governance System, Quality Management Systems, Integrity Management and Program, Strategic Performance System. Two-way referral system between health facilities can be used to facilitate decongestion. The DOH will facilitate the development of electronic medical record systems. Indigent families will also be profiled and matched to the nearest primary care provider.

On health financing, profiling information system is in the works to provide a baseline on future Geographically Isolated and Disadvantaged Areas (GIDA)-related programs. Barangay Health Stations would be established. Local and foreign missions will be encouraged to prioritize GIDAs through the Adopt-a-Community Strategy.

Participants noted in Section 29 of the Bill that the shift of prioritization from GIDA to underserved

areas seemed vague. It was suggested that identification of underserved areas should consider social determinants, such as health seeking behavior, knowledge on health and of available health services, cultural barriers, and other indirect determinants. Prioritization could be based on the outcome criteria per identified area. It was suggested to formulate mathematical model through the systematic analysis of equity indicators which are ranked to identify underserved areas.

The monitoring and evaluation of various health programs also presented its own difficulties. One is the utility of the LGU scorecard at the national level and how the LGUs can analyze this tool to improve local health systems.

### Second RTD

The second RTD held on December 6, 2018 aimed to identify what health services should be classified individual-based population-based and to clarify financing roles of the stakeholders. These discussions would guide the development of the technical and operational guidelines for the Implementing Rules and Regulations (IRR) of the UHC Act.

**DOH** Undersecretary Mario Villaverde expressed hope that the forum will further delineate which health services are populationbased and individual-based particularly services such as TB-DOTS and immunization.

Dr. Marvin C. Galvez, OIC-Division Chief Benefits Development and Research Department, PHIC, stated that most PhilHealth reimbursements come from care. He emphasized that there is a need to improve more culturally-sensitive coverage for outpatient in attending to the needs services. PhilHealth has initiated reforms on the current costing tool for provider payments and benefits developments. The long-term plan is to transition from all case rates (ACR) to diagnosisrelated groups-based global budget (DRG-GB).

Former Health Secretary Dr. Jaime **Galvez Tan** shared that the Kinapundan Hospital of Eastern Samar is not functioning despite the availability of the physical infrastructure because

there were no doctors. He appealed to DOH and PHIC to address this problem. The province has been asking for a physician under the Doctors to the Barrios program but was not assigned any in the last 10 years. He urged personnel deployment to expand to other members of the health service delivery network such as nurses and midwives.

One of his proposals is financing of the education of the indigenous people (IPs) so that they can be inpatient capacitated to be health professionals. They will be of the IPs.

College of Arts and Sciences Dean Leonardo **Estacio**, **Jr.** presented a review of the past and present policies for improving health service delivery and health financing by DOH and PHIC. He described the gaps in the financial coverage of PhilHealth and how the current law intends to address these gaps.

One of the measures is for the Local Health Boards (LHB), as mandated by the Local Government Code of 1991 through RA 7160, to

appropriate funds for health expenses. Under the UHC Act, this will be strengthened. The participants urged a revisitation of the LHBs to determine how it should be optimized.

The participants identified the weaknesses of the current service delivery networks and agreed that the lack of electronic database or registry in the LGU level deters decision-making. Gaps in the private sector data include poor implementation of disease reporting and infrequent inclusion of reports in the local setting.

The participants also discussed the criteria for population-based individual-based health services. The UHC Bill defines population-based health services as those "which have population groups as recipients" when funded by DOH. On the other hand, individual-based health services refer to "health care services that can be definitively traced back to one recipient" which are funded by PhilHealth similar as the all case rate (ACR). All HMO services are also considered individual-based.

### LECTURE TACKLES RISK **FACTOR ESTIMATION FOR NON-COMMUNICABLE DISEASES**



**Dr. Ver Bilano**, junior research fellow at the Imperial College London and newly-appointed visiting faculty of the College of Public Health (CPH) Department Epidemiology and Biostatistics (DEB) delivered a public lecture on 29 November 2018 entitled "Noncommunicable Risk Factor Estimation and Projections: A WHO Global Tobacco Use Bayesian Analysis" at the CPH Auditorium.

CPH College Secretary Dr. Vivian Fe Fadrilan-Camacho, representing Dean Romeo Quizon, emphasized the increasing global burden non-communicable disease and stated that this lecture was a step towards greater understanding of its threat to public health.

Representing UP Manila Chancellor Carmencita Padilla, Vice Chancellor for Research Dr Armando Crisostomo highlighted the importance of strengthening research initiatives within the University and hoped that the public lecture would inspire young researchers to follow the footsteps of Dr. Bilano, a young alumna who is deeply engaged in global research collaborations.

Dr. Bilano graduated from UP Manila with a BS Pharmacy (magna cum laude) and MS Public Health (Biostatistics) degrees and finished her PhD at the University of Tokyo under Monbukagakusho Scholarship. She has published papers in highjournals impact and continues to influence global health policies on risk factors non-communicable diseases.

In her risk factor estimation and projection approach, she used analytic country groupings in making her estimates, which are influenced by contextual factors that affect tobacco use within countries.

Moreover, she reported that her estimates were done

through Bayesian modeling -- building up insights from observed data with those from previous data and other well-fitting probability distributions. She described the use of open source data science software in computing her estimates, such as Python and Dismod MR. Finally, she also made use of models, such as Markov chains and Monte Carlo transformations, which provided estimates based on the probable number of people affected by tobacco based on probability and density functions.

Dr. Herdie Hizon, representing the Department of Health Epidemiology Bureau, as reactor, said that the methods described by Dr. Bilano were not those he is used to, citing instead a frequentist approach that is typical of health surveys. As a practicing epidemiologist for communicable diseases, he also shared a realization that Dr Bilano's methods may be useful in his line of work, and hoped that more units within the Department of Health would be open to collaborations.

Capping the lecture was an open forum moderated by assistant professor Dr. Amiel Bermudez which elicited questions regarding the applicability of the method in the health information systems currently available in the country and how the approach may also help improve data gathering analysis especially and in cases where there are insufficient data.

In his closing message, Dr Jaifred Christian F Lopez, chair of the public lecture committee of the CPH DEB, underscored the purpose of the approach: to help policymakers better understand the health problems through reliable data, grounded context, and improved collaboration.
